## Attendance Policy

| TITLE | Attendance Policy |
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## 1. Aims

We are committed to meeting our obligation with regards to school attendance through our wholeschoolculture and ethos that values good attendance, including:
> Promoting good attendance
> Reducing absence, including persistent and severe absence
> Ensuring every pupil has access to the full-time education to which they are
entitled > Acting early to address patterns of absence
>Building strong relationships with families to ensure pupils have the support in place to attend schoolWe will also promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

## 2. Legislation and guidance

This policy meets the requirements of the working together to improve school attendance from the Department for Education (DfE), and refers to the DfE's statutory guidance on school attendance parentalresponsibility measures. These documents are drawn from the following legislation setting out the legal powers and duties that govern school attendance:
> Part 6 of The Education Act 1996
> Part 3 of The Education Act 2002
> Part 7 of The Education and Inspections Act 2006
> The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006 (and 2010, 2011, 2013, 2016 amendments)
> The Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013
This policy also refers to the DfE's guidance on the school census, which explains the persistent absence threshold.

## 3. Roles and responsibilities

### 3.1 The governing board

The governing board is responsible for:
> Promoting the importance of school attendance across the school's policies and ethos
>Making sure school leaders fulfil expectations and statutory duties
> Regularly reviewing and challenging attendance data
> Monitoring attendance figures for the whole school
> Making sure staff receive adequate training on attendance
> Holding the headteacher to account for the implementation of this policy

### 3.2 The headteacher

The headteacher is responsible for:
> Implementation of this policy at the school
> Monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors > Supporting staff with monitoring the attendance of individual pupils > Monitoring the impact of any implemented attendance strategies
> Issuing fixed-penalty notices, where necessary

### 3.3 The designated safeguarding lead responsible for attendance

The designated safeguarding lead is responsible for:
> Leading attendance across the school
> Offering a clear vision for attendance improvement
> Evaluating and monitoring expectations and processes
> Having an oversight of data analysis
> Devising specific strategies to address areas of poor attendance identified through
data > Arranging calls and meetings with parents to discuss attendance issues
>Delivering targeted intervention and support to pupils and families
The designated senior leader responsible for attendance is Clare Blackburn and can be contacted via 01924 456811.

### 3.4 The attendance officer/Family Wellbeing Officer

The school Family Wellbeing Officer is responsible for:
> Monitoring and analysing attendance data (see section 7)
>Benchmarking attendance data to identify areas of focus for improvement
> Providing regular attendance reports to school staff and reporting concerns about attendance to thedesignated senior leader responsible for attendance and the headteacher
> Working with education welfare officers to tackle persistent absence
> Advising the headteacher (authorised by the headteacher) when to issue fixed-penalty notices
The attendance officer is Liz Blythe and can be contacted via 01924456811.

### 3.5 Class Teachers

Class Teachers are responsible for recording attendance on a daily basis, using the correct codes, and submitting this information to the school office by 9am on the same day.

### 3.6 School Business Support Team

School Business Support Team staff will:
> Take calls from families about absence on a day-to-day basis and record it on the school system
> Transfer calls from families to the Family Wellbeing Office in order to provide them with more detailed support on attendance

### 3.7 Parents/carers

Parents/carers are expected to:
> Make sure their child attends every day on time
> Call the school to report their child's absence before 9am on the day of the absence and each subsequentday of absence, and advise when they are expected to return
>Provide the school with more than 1 emergency contact number for their child
> Ensure that, where possible, appointments for their child are made outside of the school day

### 3.8 Pupils

Pupils are expected to:
> Attend school every day on time
> Attend every timetabled session on time

## 4. Recording attendance

### 4.1 Attendance register

We will keep an attendance register, and place all pupils onto this register.
We will take our attendance register at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second session. It will mark whether every pupil is:
> Present
> Attending an approved off-site educational
activity > Absent
> Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances
Any amendment to the attendance register will include:
> The original entry
> The amended entry
> The reason for the amendment
> The date on which the amendment was made
> The name and position of the person who made the amendmentSee appendix 1 for the DfE attendance codes.

We will also record:
> Whether the absence is authorised or not
> The nature of the activity if a pupil is attending an approved educational activity
> The nature of circumstances where a pupil is unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances We will keep every entry on the attendance register for 3 years after the date on which the entry was made.Pupils must arrive in school by 9am on each school day.

The register for the first session will be taken at 9am and will be kept open until 9.15am. The register for the second session will be taken at 1 pm and will be kept open until 1.15 pm .

### 4.2 Unplanned absence

The pupil's parent/carer must notify the school of the reason for the absence on the first day of an unplanned absence by 9 am or as soon as practically possible by calling the school office.

Please phone 01924456811 and press option 1 for attendance.
We will mark absence due to illness as authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.
If the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask the pupil's parent/carer to provide medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence. We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily.
If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorisedand parents/carers will be notified of this in advance.

### 4.3 Planned absence

Attending a medical or dental appointment will be counted as authorised as long as the pupil's parent/carer notifies the school in advance of the appointment.

However, we encourage parents/carers to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours wherepossible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary.

The pupil's parent/carer must also apply for other types of term-time absence as far in advance as possible ofthe requested absence. Go to section 5 to find out which term-time absences the school can authorise.

### 4.4 Lateness and punctuality

A pupil who arrives late:
> Before the register has closed will be marked as late, using the appropriate code
> After the register has closed will be marked as absent, using the appropriate
code
Parents of pupils who are regularly late will be contacted by the Family Wellbeing Officer.

### 4.5 Following up unexplained absence

Where any pupil we expect to attend school does not attend, or stops attending, without reason, the schoolwill:
>Call the pupil's parent/carer on the morning of the first day of unexplained absence to ascertain the reason. If the school cannot reach any of the pupil's emergency contacts, the school may carry
out ahome visit, contact the Police/Social Care.
> Identify whether the absence is approved or not
> Identify the correct attendance code to use and input it as soon as the reason for absence is ascertained -this will be no later than 5 working days after the session
>Call the parent/carer on each day that the absence continues without explanation to ensure proper safeguarding action is taken where necessary. If absence continues, the school will consider involving an education welfare officer

### 4.6 Reporting to parents/carers

The school will regularly inform parents about their child's attendance and absence levels via Annual Review reports and End of year reports.

## 5. Authorised and unauthorised absence

### 5.1 Approval for term-time absence

The headteacher will only grant a leave of absence to a pupil during term time if they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'. A leave of absence is granted at the headteacher's discretion, including the length of time the pupil is authorised to be absent for.

The school considers each application for term-time absence individually, taking into account the specificfacts, circumstances and relevant context behind the request.

Any request should be submitted as soon as it is anticipated and, where possible in accordance with anyleave of absence request form, accessible via the school office or by following this link.
https://ravenshallschool.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/2023/06/LOA-request-form.pdf The headteacher may require evidence to support any request for leave of absence.

Valid reasons for authorised absence include:
> Illness and medical/dental appointments (see sections 4.2 and 4.3 for more detail)
> Religious observance - 3 days are permitted within a 12 month period where a religion other than Christianity is practiced and the day falls on a usual school day.
> Traveller pupils travelling for occupational purposes - this covers Roma, English and Welsh gypsies, Irish and Scottish travellers, showmen (fairground people) and circus people, bargees (occupational boat dwellers) and new travellers. Absence may be authorised only when a traveller family is known to be travelling for occupational purposes and has agreed this with the school, but it is not known whether the pupil is attending educational provision

### 5.2 Legal sanctions

The school or local authority can fine parents for the unauthorised absence of their child from school, wherethe child is of compulsory school age.

If issued with a fine, or penalty notice, each parent must pay $£ 60$ within 21 days or $£ 120$ within 28 days. The payment must be made directly to the local authority.

Penalty notices can be issued by a headteacher, local authority officer or the police. The decision on whether or not to issue a penalty notice may take into account:
> The number of unauthorised absences occurring within a rolling academic year
> One-off instances of irregular attendance, such as leave of absence taken in term time without
permission ${ }^{>}$Where an excluded pupil is found in a public place during school hours without a justifiable reason

There must be a minimum consecutive absence of 10 school sessions (this can be split over weekends or school holidays before triggering a penalty notice request.

Failure to pay the penalty notice could result in the Local Authority commencing legal proceedings against youfor the offence of not ensuring your child's regular school attendance. If found guilty, you may be fined up to
$£ 1,000$ and you will receive a criminal record.
Repeated offences of Leave of Absence may result in the matter being directly prosecuted in Kirklees Magistrates'court.

## 6. Strategies for promoting attendance

Good and improved attendance is celebrated in assemblies with attendance certificates and rewards.

## 7. Attendance monitoring

### 7.1 Monitoring attendance

The school will:
Monitor attendance and absence data half-termly, termly and yearly across the school and at an individualpupil level
> Identify whether or not there are particular groups of children whose absences may be a cause for concern

Pupil-level absence data will be collected each term and published at national and local authority level throughthe DfE's school absence national statistics releases. The underlying school-level absence data is published alongside the national statistics. The school will compare attendance data to the national average, and share this with the governing board.

### 7.2 Analysing attendance

The school will:
> Analyse attendance and absence data regularly to identify pupils or cohorts that need additional supportwith their attendance, and use this analysis to provide targeted support to these pupils and their families
> Look at historic and emerging patterns of attendance and absence, and then develop strategies toaddress these patterns

### 7.3 Using data to improve attendance

The school will:
> Provide regular attendance reports to Key Stage Leaders and other school leaders, to facilitate discussions with pupils and families
> Use data to monitor and evaluate the impact of any interventions put in place in order to modify them andinform future strategies

### 7.4 Reducing persistent and severe absence

Persistent absence is where a pupil misses $10 \%$ or more of school, and severe absence is where a pupil misses $50 \%$ or more of school.

The school will:
> Use attendance data to find patterns and trends of persistent and severe absence
> Hold regular meetings with the parents of pupils who the school and the Local Authority Attendance andPupil Support Officer considers to be vulnerable, or are persistently or severely absent, to discuss attendance and engagement at school
> Provide access to wider support services to remove the barriers to
attendance > Support with accessing school transport arrangements
> Hold parental workshops to support with good school
attendance > Support pupils with reward systems

## 8. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed as guidance from the local authority or DfE is updated, and as a minimum every 3years by Clare Blackburn/Deputy Head. At every review, the policy will be approved by the full governing board.

## Appendix 1: attendance codes

The following codes are taken from the DfE's guidance on school attendance.
